"This is a hit to lowa corn growers and ethanol producers. The decision to ban carbon capture and sequestration projects cuts off our ability to tap into markets for ultralow carbon ethanol and puts lowa corn growers at a disadvantage compared to states pursuing CCS

projects."

"QCCP is currently shutdown due to the difficult economics... if QCCP was able to sequester carbon today, improved margins of approximately 20 cpg or more would allow our plant to operate."



"We ask you to do no harm to the lowa agricultural economy. No farmer will lose profitability by vetoing HF 639, no ethanol plant will go out of business because HF 639 was vetoed, and no business will wonder if they should come to lowa due to the regulatory uncertainty if HF 639 is vetoed."
